I. Welcome, Introductions, and Map

Welcome to CoC Board members, LHC Chairs, and others. Introduction of what THN and the TX BoS CoC are. Attendees identified their communities by indicating them on the interactive map.

II. Member Input (poll questions and discussion)

a. How can the CoC better support communities?

Some answers given - Regional homeless coalition meetings, PIT meetings and assistance, regional needs assessment, funding/money, visiting our communities, Osnium assistance, rural affordable housing, virtual access to annual conference, more understandable meeting info, HMIS training, a "CoC for Dummies" manual

b. How can CoC General Meetings be improved?

Some answers given - HMIS training during meeting, more interactive and participatory, keep them closer to an hour, maybe a different or better time (not during peak time), post agenda and materials ahead of time.

III. Training -- Equal Access to Housing

Samantha Foss, social work intern at THN, gave a presentation on Equal Access to Housing

- HUD saw alarming statistics of the numbers of people experiencing homelessness who identify as Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, or Queer (LGBTQ)—disproportionate to their representation in the general population. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) released rules and guidance to assist projects, CoCs, and communities with equal access to housing and services.
- List of websites (at bottom of agenda) that would be helpful to view, to make sure projects are providing equal access and that all projects are following HUD's recommendations even projects that do not receive funding from HUD.



- It is a HUD and TX BoS CoC priority to provide person-centered and low-barrier assistance for the cultures within each community
- Question on how to handle placing roommates where one person may identify as LGBTQ and another person may not agree with the roommate placement.
 - It is important to have conversations with potential project participants prior to entry into a project about how the project expects respect for everyone and respects all participants' wishes. It is also important to have conversations with anyone who identifies as LGBTQ about what can be done to help them feel comfortable and safe. The intention is creating safe spaces for everyone.

IV. CoC Priority Projects

- a. CoC Program
- Funding comes from Congress and is distributed through the Notice of Funding Availability (NOFA). THN facilitates a local application process/competition.
- CoC Program funds are not intended to be the sole source of funding to address homelessness in a community but to help leverage other funding and to guide a community in their efforts.
- 19 renewal project applications and 3 new project applications were submitted in 2018
- Data is continuing to be emphasized in how projects and CoCs are being scored, which affects the likelihood that projects will receive funding
- Housing First is also a HUD and CoC priority. If you have questions about how to get involved with a Housing First initiative in your community, contact <u>Jim@thn.org</u>.

b. Coordinated Entry (CE)

- CE streamlines the process for people experiencing homelessness to receive an assessment and be connected to the housing resources they need and that would best end their homelessness.
- Because it involves systems change and developing a housing crisis response system, CE encompasses everything in a continuum of care, including local homeless coalitions (LHCs), the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) Program and CoC Program funding
- The TX BoS CoC is in charge of implementing CE in 215 counties, and CE processes are currently implemented in 17 regions covering 46 counties.

 - c. Homeless Management Information System (HMIS)
- THN has a YouTube channel with numerous videos about Client Track (HMIS software) and HMIS, in general, to help people learn how to use HMIS
- System Performance Measures (SPMs), which can be generated from data in HMIS, are being used in HUD's funding decisions more frequently now. They measure project and system effectiveness. They can be run CoC-wide or by-community or by-project.



- A by-name list is a list of people in a community who are experiencing homelessness and whose data from the VI-SPDAT and CE assessment are in HMIS. The list can be used to see who meets the "chronically homeless" definition and to estimate future rates of homelessness. See THN's videos for more information, or contact <u>hmis@thn.org</u>.

d. Data

- Data is an incredible tool to understand and solve homelessness. It can help communities and projects identify appropriate strategies to tackle homelessness.
- Going forward there will be a data point featured at each General Meeting and how it can be accessed and used, as part of increasing data literacy (how to understand data and use it to make decisions).

- a. CoC Board -- elections
- Fifteen members who set the CoC's policies and guide its work
- Elections for even-numbered seats, for two-year terms, will be held in September. More information will be posted on THN's website and sent via the CoC's email list. Anyone who lives or works in the CoC, is affiliated with homeless services, and is not currently a project participant in a CoC Program-funded project or ESG Program-funded project, may run for a seat on the board. Please advertise this opportunity.
 - b. Local Homeless Coalitions (LHCs)
- An LHC is a group of people and organizations in a community that work together to prevent and end homelessness in their local communities within the CoC
- LHCs meet requirements set by the THN Board. Contact information and coverage maps are on THN's website.

2018 CoC Board Member Elections

The CoC is required to establish a Board that acts on behalf of the CoC.

- The Board must be representative of the relevant organizations within the CoC's geographic area and of projects serving homeless subpopulations, including at least one person with lived experience (currently or formerly homeless).
- The Board is the main policy-making and oversight body of the CoC.

Texas Homeless Network (THN), as the Lead Agency for the TX BoS CoC, facilitates the election process.

CoC members may nominate themselves. CoC members may nominate other persons. Anyone who lives or works in one of the 215 counties included in the TX BoS CoC is considered to be a member of the CoC.

- Board nominees must be affiliated with homeless services in the TX BoS CoC.
- Current participants ("clients") of CoC Program-funded or ESG Programfunded projects are not eligible to run for a seat on the Board.

Persons nominated for the CoC Board should possess the following characteristics:

- High level of ethical behavior;
- A working knowledge of homelessness;
- A passion for ending homelessness;
- Familiarity with one or more state or federal funding sources (preferred);
- Capability to work effectively on a team;
- Availability of time to fulfill Board responsibilities;
- Compliance with the CoC Governance Charter and/or applicable policies; and
- Must live and/or work in the TX BoS CoC's geographic area.

While Seat 1 must always be filled by a person with lived experience, not a representative of persons with lived experience, the person filling Board seats 2-15 will represent the stakeholder group designated for that seat in one of the following ways:

- Being a member of that group (for example, Seat 2 could be filled by a currently or formerly homeless veteran);
- Working for an agency/organization that serves the designated group; and/or
- Clearly representing the interests of that group, as evidenced in the potential Board member's nomination form.



Board Members will have responsibilities and duties described in the Board Member Requirements Policy and Procedures, including complying with a Code of Conduct and a Conflict of Interest Statement.

The CoC Board has historically met every-other month for two hours via webinar, plus three Special Called Meetings via webinar during the CoC Program local application process (around September).

Local Homeless Coalitions (LHCs)

- Texas Homeless Network (THN) is the lead agency for the TX BoS CoC.
- The TX BoS CoC covers 215 of Texas' 254 counties, totaling 85% of Texas' land mass. To end homelessness across this broad region, the TX BoS CoC utilizes a system of LHCs to help coordinate local resources and meet the CoC's goals.
- LHCs are the community groups working in TX BoS CoC communities that provide local expertise and planning, delivery, and evaluation of homeless services, housing, and supportive services.
- LHCs' goals align with the CoC's goals and LHC chairs act as liaisons to the CoC.
- LHCs meet LHC Requirements established by the CoC Board.

LHCs make plans to address homelessness in their communities, pursue CoC goals, and lead local initiatives. Help Us Improve VI-SPDAT & SPDAT

We take the VI-SPDAT and SPDAT very seriously. Whether your community uses the VI-SPDAT (triage tool) and/or the SPDAT (assessment tool), we want to have your input as we go about making improvements to the next versions of the tools. Have your say through our survey which you can find here

Your input is vitally important. We will be looking at what you contribute along with what people with lived experience have to say, trainers have to say, the most current research has to say, and what experts in trauma, domestic violence, and anti-oppression have to say.

We are committed to making each version of the tools easier to use and more accurate in their collection of information. We are committed to also ensuring the best interests of people to whom the tools are administered are respected. We want to ensure the most accurate information and only the most relevant information is used to help with things like coordinated entry and prioritization, as well as case management and service delivery.

We have been collecting feedback in other ways over the past few years on all of the VI-SPDAT and SPDAT suite of tools (youth, family, single adult, justice discharge, prevention and diversion). As we move towards the next versions of the tools we are committed to doing a few things better, as well as exploring whether some of the input we have received is relevant for triaging or measuring acuity. For example, we commit to examining the wording of Q17 of the American Version of the VI-SPDAT. We also commit to exploring whether a Young Head of Household Family VI-SPDAT is warranted. We are going to take a look (again) at what a medical facility discharge VI-SPDAT may look like. While we have always had the tools reviewed and critiqued from an anti-oppression framework and have reached out to various cultural groups in developing the tools, we are going to apply a more rigorous lens to matters of culture, race and ethnicity as it impacts the collection of information and use of information collected through the tools. Finally, one of the other things we are already committed to doing is providing clearer instructions for the opening script and guidance on information capture to improve reliability of information received.

It is not lost on us that the VI-SPDAT and SPDAT suite of tools have changed the way homeless service delivery is provided. We hope and trust you will help us make the next evolution of the tools better. We thank you for your help.
