- I. **Welcome and Introductions** – Mary Stahlke, CoC Manager, welcomed members to the meeting and introduced staff. Attendees were participating via webinar.
- II. **Summary of Prior Meeting** – Mary summarized the 9/26/2018 meeting.
- III. **Data Snapshot** – Chad Wheeler from Open Door in Lubbock, and CoC Board Member, presented a postcard-sized data dashboard that the agency developed to inform people about how Open Door is ending homelessness. A local graphic design company created the design. The size was chosen because it works well on Facebook. The agency mailed postcards, put a picture of it in their newsletter, and handed copies to people at the agency's open house. The data highlight that 0 (zero) people that Open Door has assisted to exit from homelessness have returned to a homeless situation. The data also contained an estimated cost savings. (see the first slide in the Data presentation for a picture of the postcard)
- IV. **How We are Ending Homelessness – With HMIS and Data**
 - a. Kristin Zakoor, Assistant Director for Data, presented information on the Point-In-Time (PIT) Count and the Housing Inventory Count (HIC). The PIT is an unduplicated count on a single night of people in a community who are experiencing homelessness, both unsheltered and sheltered. Who is experiencing homelessness? What services are needed to get them housed? The data can help to identify patterns and trends. The PIT is an opportunity to provide awareness to your community, for example by getting volunteers involved, then they will better understand the issue. January 24, 2019, 12:01 AM – 11:59 PM.  - b. Housing Inventory Count (HIC): The HIC is an inventory of all beds available to serve the homeless population. All beds (emergency shelter, transitional housing, rapid re-housing, and permanent supportive housing) will be included in the HIC, even if the projects are

not using HMIS. Contact Kristin to participate. The PIT measures people, and the HIC measures housing available for those people.

- c. Victoria Lopez, HMIS Program Coordinator, discussed the importance of using HMIS. 1) HMIS has the power to speed up workflows because there is less paperwork involved. 2) HMIS is capable of producing many kinds of reports, and that data can be used to apply for funding, for example. 3) HMIS data can help to identify which services are in demand, so funding can be allocated, accordingly. 4) HMIS can give a general overview of your homeless population. In response to questions from attendees, Victoria responded that users are not able to upload documents directly to HMIS at this time because of space limitations, and data on victims of domestic violence is not allowed to be entered into HMIS, so victim services agencies use an HMIS-comparable database.
- d. Matthew Devine, HMIS Support Specialist, discussed keeping the HMIS data secure. THN uses an HMIS vendor, so all data is stored remotely, in the cloud, and is HIPAA-compliant. Users log in through a Web portal, so they do not have to download software. All data is encrypted in transmission to the server.
- e. Antonio Kufof, HMIS Data Specialist. Showed a map of the CoC's HMIS coverage area. We have many areas that aren't covered by HMIS. If not all areas are using HMIS, you and we don't know if your community and other communities are serving the same participants, which makes it hard to ensure that people are served seamlessly across CoC communities. Also, the more organizations that use HMIS, the more that are in our referral network, which is helpful for Coordinated Entry. Victoria added that agencies using HMIS provide the data that HUD uses to represent the entire CoC. Since situations differ from region to region, the more HMIS users there are, the more your participants' stories can be represented in the CoC's data.
- f. Jesús DeLeón-Serratos, HMIS Project Manager, discussed System Performance Measures (SPMs), which are designed to analyze the effectiveness of housing crisis response systems. The SPMs measure:
 - i. Length of time homeless
 - ii. Returns to homelessness (to stop recidivism)
 - iii. Number of people experiencing homelessness
 - iv. Increase in participants' employment and income
 - v. Number of first-time homelessness
 - vi. Successful placement in permanent housing

Universal Data Quality reports (UDQs) help to “clean” the data and make it more accurately represent what agencies are doing.

V. CoC Priority Projects

- a. HMIS
 - i. Longitudinal System Analysis (LSA) – Jesús DeLeón-Serratos, HMIS Project Manager -- This report is the updated version of the Annual Homelessness Assessment Report (AHAR). THN compiles data from the HMIS to report to HUD. Reports are due November 30th.
- b. Point-in-Time (PIT) Count – January 24, 2019 – Kyra Henderson, Data Coordinator, will plan and execute the PIT, HIC, and SPM reports.
 - i. Training on the app (software application) used to interview people during the count will be held on November 29th, from 11:00-12:30
 - ii. PIT Count Leads Q&A Webinar – December 4th, 1:00-2:30
- c. Coordinated Entry (CE) – Tiffany Hart, Systems Change Coordinator
 - i. CE data: The CoC has 17 CE regions, each with a Coordinated Entry Planning Entity (CEPE), 124 participating agencies, and 252 trained assessors. We're growing, but we have a long way to go to get to full expansion.
 - ii. Coordinated Entry Unplugged is a monthly phone call for CE assessors and other CE staff. The calls are topic-driven and community-led and -focused. 66 people attended the first call on 11/13. The December 18th call will talk about resources for CE (what they are, where they are, and how to use them). The spotlight community will be Lubbock.
- d. CoC Program – Jim Ward, Assistant Director for Planning
 - i. If you participated in the FY 2018 competition process, you should have received a survey requesting your feedback on the process. Please let us know how it went for you, and how it could be better next year.
 - ii. A CoC committee is being developed, to guide process improvement.
 - iii. The Rapid Re-Housing (RRH) Learning Collaborative is a six-month learning opportunity for RRH projects funded by the CoC Program to learn about best practices in RRH..
 - iv. If your operating year ended in Aug. 31, your Annual Performance Report (APR) is due in 14 days. If you need help, THN is able to give you a hand.
 - v. Quarterly performance scorecards will begin again. Projects are being assessed regularly to see how they are doing and to identify how THN can support them.

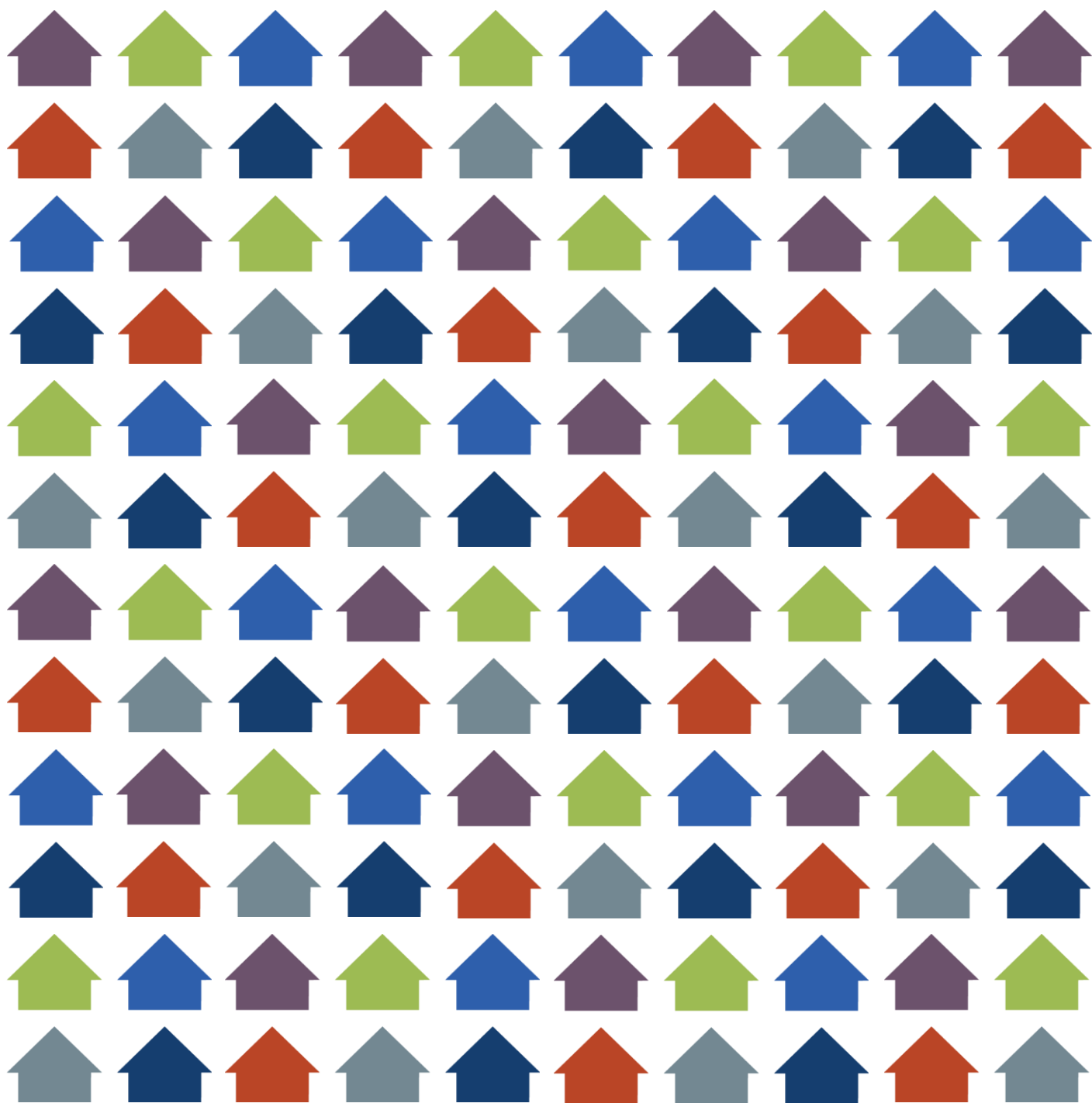

Point-in-Time Count (PIT)



PIT Basics

- How many people are currently homeless in your community?
- How many people are currently experiencing chronic homelessness in your community?
- How many of them are families, youth, or veterans?

The answers to these questions and more can be answered by point-in-time counts.

A point-in-time count is an unduplicated count on a single night of the people in a community who are experiencing homelessness.



WHY A POINT-IN-TIME



EXTENT

- Characteristics of those experiencing homelessness

AWARENESS

- Raise community awareness

Housing Inventory Count (HIC)



HIC Basics

- Each year, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) requires each Continuum of Care (CoC) to count its Housing Inventory Count (HIC) on the same night as the annually required Point-in-Time (PIT) count.
- HIC to be completed on **January 24, 2019.**



What we Count...

- The HIC includes inventory and capacity information about all programs dedicated to serving homeless persons in a community, regardless of the source of funding. The HIC captures inventory information for the following program types:

Shelter:

- Emergency Shelter
- Transitional Housing

Permanent Housing:

- Rapid Re-Housing
 - Permanent Supportive Housing

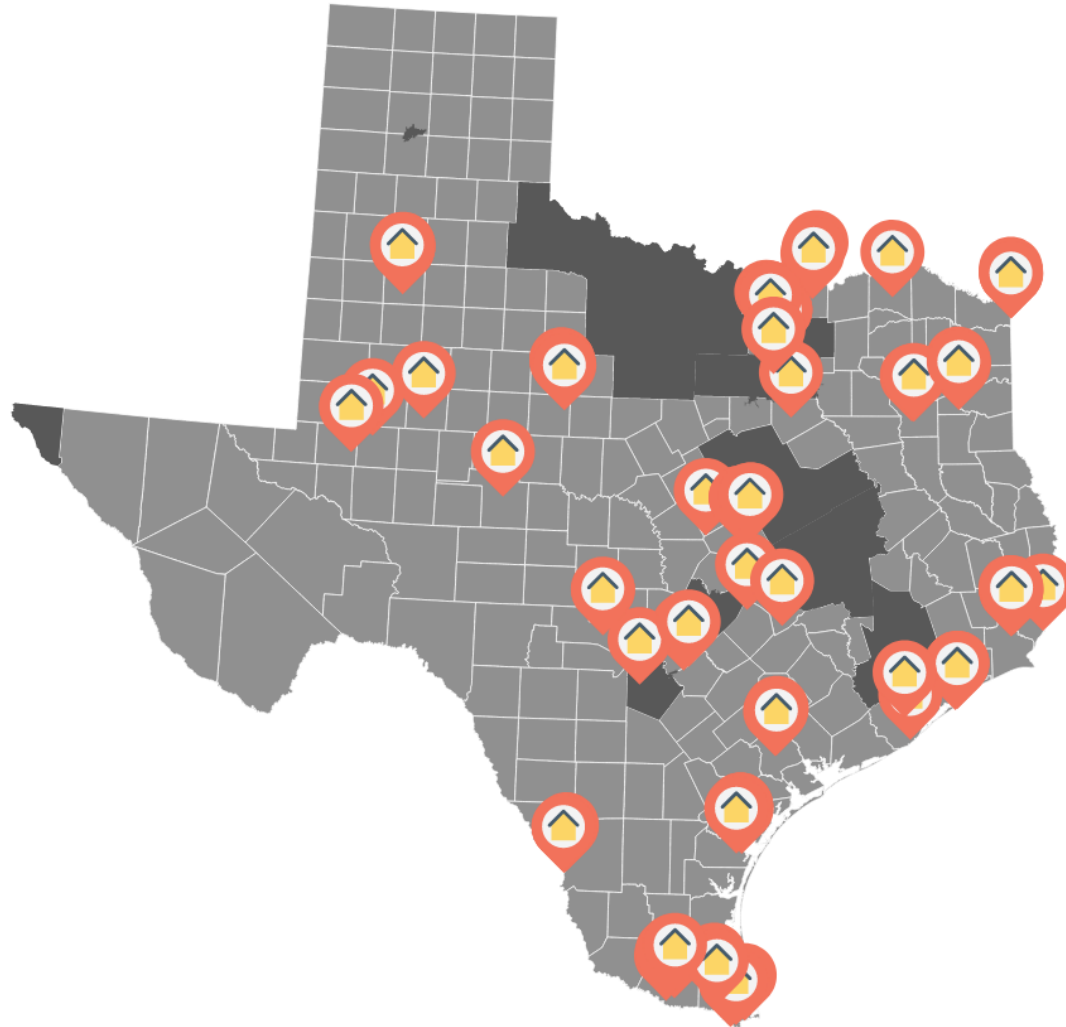

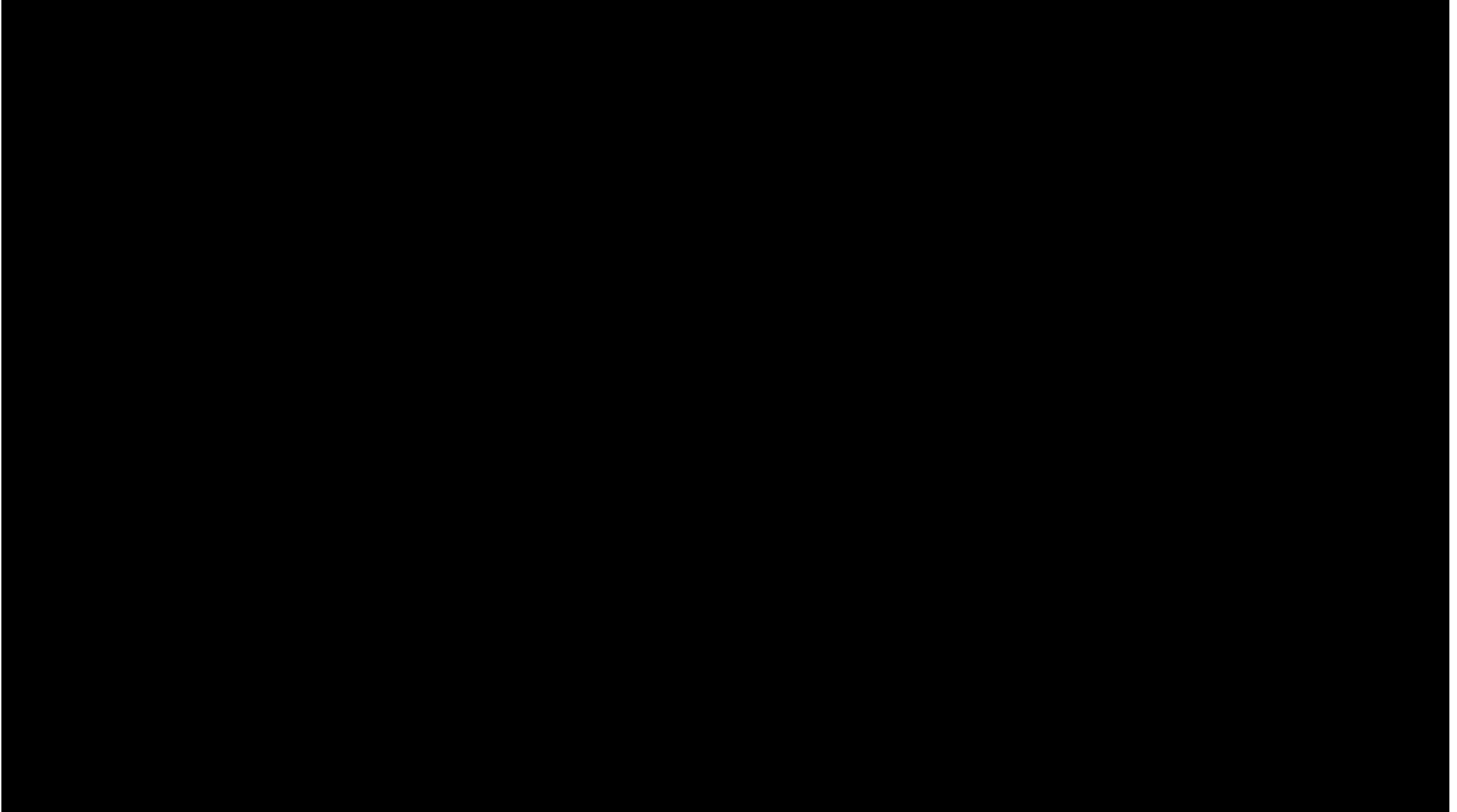
HMIS Coverage Area
