#### **New COVID-19 Guidance**

THN recognizes the seriousness of the pandemic for people experiencing homelessness. The U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has released <u>information</u> about helping people experiencing homelessness during the COVID-19 surge. Homeless services providers are encouraged to work with emergency management and public health partners to vaccinate eligible people, ensure quarantine and isolation spaces, and use non-congregate sheltering options.

The National Alliance to End Homelessness (NAEH) has published a <u>summary</u> of the Center for Disease Control and Prevention's (CDC's) updated guidance on COVID-19 quarantine and isolation for shelter residents and staff. The <u>CDC's website</u> also contains more information on COVID-19 and supporting persons experiencing homelessness.

# 2022 State of Texas Low Income Housing Plan and Annual Report (SLIHP)

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) will hold a public comment period on the Draft 2022 State of Texas Low Income Housing Plan and Annual Report (SLIHP) from 12/20/2021 through 1/10/2022. Also, a public hearing will take place on **Wednesday**, **January 12**, **2022**, **at 2 p.m. CST**. Register Here.

The SLIHP offers a comprehensive reference on statewide housing needs, housing resources, and strategies for funding allocations. It reviews TDHCA's housing programs, current and future policies, resource allocation plans to meet state housing needs, and reports on performance during the preceding state fiscal year (9/1/2020-8/31/2021).

#### **HOME-ARP Allocation Plan AAQ Help Desk Now Open**

HUD has launched the HOME-American Rescue Plan (HOME-ARP) Allocation Plan Ask A Question (AAQ) help desk to respond to questions from Participating Jurisdictions (PJs) as they prepare, develop, and submit their HOME-ARP allocation plans. Submit questions about consultation, public participation, needs assessment, and submission and review requirements.

Also, HUD has released a <u>webinar</u> that discusses the planning process for HOME-ARP funds and a discussion guide that PJs can use when consulting with stakeholders. PJs may consult with THN, as the lead support agency for the CoC. Contact <u>Mary@thn.org</u>.

We also request that PJs consult with Local Homeless Coalitions (LHCs) in their communities. See the <u>LHC section of THN's website</u> for contact information.

And we encourage PJs to talk with individuals with lived experience of homelessness, homeless services providers, PHAs, public agencies, and agencies serving people with disabilities as well as people of color, who are disproportionately represented in the homeless population.

#### 2022 Point In Time Count

Thursday, January 27, 2022

The Point-in-Time (PIT) count is a count of sheltered and unsheltered homeless persons on a single night in January. HUD requires that Continuums of Care conduct an annual count of homeless persons who are sheltered in emergency shelters and transitional housing on a single night. Continuums of Care also must conduct a count of unsheltered homeless persons every other year (odd-numbered years).
