Using video conferencing technology, the telementoring program connects subject matter experts with health care workers in underserved, remote or rural communities to help them increase their knowledge and incorporate best practices for screening and treatment of SUD.

CoC Program Description

The Continuum of Care (CoC) Program is designed to:

- Promote a community-wide commitment to the goal of ending homelessness;
- Provide funding... to quickly re-house homeless persons... while minimizing trauma and dislocation caused by homelessness;
- Promote access to and effective utilization of mainstream programs by persons in homeless situations; and
- Optimize self-sufficiency among persons experiencing homelessness.

The TX BoS CoC is directed by the TX BoS CoC Board of Directors, made up of 16 elected members, each with a specific focus area. The CoC Board determines the policy direction of the CoC and ensures that the CoC fulfills its responsibilities. Additionally, the Board oversees the work of CoC committees and the CoC Lead Agency and HMIS Lead Agency (THN).

CoC Program Requirements

- Document homelessness and chronic homelessness, as well as any other eligibility criterion for each project participant
- Use the Homeless Management Information System (HMIS) (or, for victim services, an HMIS-comparable database) to collect data
- Participate in Coordinated Entry (CE)
- Report performance in Annual Performance Reports (APRs) and in the System Performance Measures (SPMs)
- Adhere to the CoC Program Interim Rule and other applicable regulations, policies, procedures, and TX BoS CoC standards expectations
