MCKINNEY-VENTO ACT 101

- Established in 1987 <u>BISD McKinney-Vento 101</u>
- Students who lack a fix, regular or adequate nighttime residency
- Living in shelters, cars, trailer parks, RV's, substandard living conditions, doubled-up with family/friends
- Right to: School of origin, transportation, enrollment barriers removed, school stability, and equal access
- Every school district has an appointed MV Liaison
- Awareness is key!



TEXAS APPLESEED

- Texas Appleseed is a public interest justice center that works to change unjust laws and policies that prevent Texans from realizing their full potential.
- We are a non-partisan, 501c3 non-profit
 - Texas Appleseed anchors a dynamic network of pro bono partners and collaborators to develop and advocate for innovative and practical solutions to complex issues.
- We work across all levels of government to advocate for all Texans!



FREE IDS AND DRIVER'S LICENSE!

- In 2019, the Texas Legislature passed House Bill 123 which gives young people experiencing homelessness a fee waiver for their driver's license, identification documents, and birth certificates.
 - Youth need to certify they are experiencing homelessness by completing a simple form.
 - The form can be signed by a McKinney-Vento liaison or a Director of a drop-in shelter, emergency shelter, or transitional living program.
 - This form can be found at the www.WeDoExist.org site.
- Additionally, the new law allows young people experiencing homelessness or who
 are in foster care to use a school or shelter as their address so they can receive
 these documents.

FREE DRIVER'S ED CLASSES!



- Youth experiencing homelessness and those who are or have aged out of foster care can qualify for the Youth Driver Education Funding (YDEF) Program!
- The YDEF Program was established during the 87th Texas Legislative Session under Senate Bill (SB) 2054 to reduce barriers for these young people to get their driver's licenses.
- Who is eligible for this program?
 - People under the age of 26 who:
 - were in or still is in foster care; OR
 - Is a homeless youth defined by 42 United States Code §11434a
- Youth will have to identify a driver education provider that meets the state's criteria
 - Is registered and licensed with the state and their cost does not exceed twice the average rate of other driver's ed programs within the city.
- Read the <u>Texas Workforce Commission's final rules</u> for the program on their website.

SCHOOL RIGHTS FOR YOUTH EXPERIENCING HOMELESSNESS OR IN FOSTER CARE

- As of the 2019 Legislative Session, Texas Appleseed successfully advocated for two bills that provide protections for vulnerable youth in school.
- Schools cannot give out-of-school suspension for students experiencing homelessness!
- K-12 public schools are now required to consider a student's foster care or homelessness status in the case of disciplinary action.
- We are working with McKinney-Vento liaisons to help provide guidance on implementing both bills.



HOW CAN YOUTH GET INVOLVED?

- The next session starts soon and there are a lot of opportunities to become an advocate!
 - The regular session is from January 10, 2023, through May 29, 2023.
- Testifying during the Texas Legislative Session
 - There are opportunities to testify in both committee and floor hearings in both chambers of the Legislature.
- Contact your elected officials!
 - You can call your state legislators or drop by their office in person.


