

Terms and Definitions

- LGBTQIA+ | An acronym for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer or Questioning, Intersex, and Asexual.
- **Sexual Orientation** | An inherent or immutable enduring emotional, romantic, or sexual attraction to other people.
- **Gender Identity** | One's innermost concept of self as male, female, a blend of both, or neither how individuals perceive themselves and what they call themselves.
- **Gender Expression** | External appearance of one's gender identity, usually expressed through behavior, clothing, haircut, or voice, and which may or may not conform to socially defined behaviors and characteristics typically associated with being either masculine or feminine.
- **Survival Sex** | Exchanging sex in oder to secure basic needs for youth this could be-Housing, Shelter, Food, Money, Shower, Drugs to cope, etc.
- CSEY | An acronym for Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Youth.



Factors Leading to Youth Homelessness

Risk Factors for Youth Homelessness

How did we get here?

- Aging out of care / history of foster care involvement
- Familial dysfunction
- Abuse or neglect
- Running away
- Exiting the Juvenile Justice system






Risk Factors for LGBTQ+ Youth Homelessness

How did we get here?


- LGBTQ+ youth are 120% more likely to experience homelessness.
- Increased difficulty in accessing services.
- Discrimination while receiving supportive services can keep queer YYA in the homelessness cycle.
- LGBTQ+ YYA are more likely to be impacted by CSE due to their increased vulnerability.





Trauma and Adversity

Adversity and Trauma





- Adversity refers to the event(s) themselves.
- Trauma is the overwhelming
 nature of an event or repeated
 events and the accompanying
 harm that it creates for an
 individual.
- Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) are potentially traumatic events that occur in childhood.



Types of Trauma

- Single incident trauma
- Complex trauma
- Developmental trauma
- Intergenerational trauma
- Historical trauma







Scenario Activity

Scenario

Let's dissect this challenge as a group

Helen sees her co-worker yell at one of the youth in their housing program for not picking up after themself. Later, she notices the youth is not eating or engaging in group activities. When asked questions, the youth appears visibly disconnected and disoriented.



Scenario Activity

15 minutes

- 1. Clarify the problem Identify the problem(s) that arise in this scenario.
- 2. **Identify options** Brainstorm a number of different options that are available to address the problem at hand.
- 3. **Weigh outcomes** Talk through some of the options presented and possible outcomes of going in those directions. Weigh pros and cons.
- **4. Do it. Listen. Reassess.** Decide on a direction and talk through implementation as a group. How do we see this playing out? What are some possible future barriers or complications that might arise?
 - a. **During**: What might happen in the moment?
 - b. After: What might happen immediately after the situation?
 - c. Follow-up: What might happen 1-2 weeks later?
 - d. Before: How can we prevent this situation from happening again?




Challenges While Experiencing Homelessness

- Physical Safety






Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs

Vulnerability Risks


Bad policies leave big impacts



- Camping bans in cities lead to the suburbanization of homelessness.
 - Disconnected from identified resources and networks
 - Increased vulnerability
- Evictions make it difficult to find a new place to live.
- Services located in unsafe parts of town create additional barriers to exiting the cycle of homelessness.



Survival Strategies

Coping mechanisms and survival tactics

- Coping Mechanisms
 - Drugs and/or alcohol
 - Self isolation
 - Running away
- Avoidance
- Closeting One's Identity
- Couch Hopping
- Survival Sex
 - o For housing, food, money, drugs, etc.



Pathways to Commercial Sexual Exploitation

A slippery slope

- Some pathways that lead to CSE while experiencing homelessness include:
 - Romeo Exploitation (seduction by romantic or sexual partner)
 - Guerilla Exploitation (violence, threats, force)
 - Peer-to-Peer Recruitment
 - Gang-based Recruitment
 - Internet Enticement (social media, chat rooms)
 - Survival Sex
 - Illicit Sexually Oriented Businesses (SOBs)



Youth Homelessness and CSEY

Intersections

- 114,000 youth were identified as homeless in 2019.
- Lack of financial, familial, community, housing, food, or medical stability/support increase risk of exploitation.
- Family and Youth Services Bureau partnered with Runaway and Homeless Youth Training and Technical Assistance Center (RHYTTAC) to release "Human Trafficking in Youth-serving Programs: A Blueprint for Organizations Working with Street Youth, Homeless Youth, and Youth at Risk."

Youth Homelessness, LGBTQ+, and CSEY

Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Youth

- The challenges LGBTQ+ youth face push them onto the streets with limited options for survival.
 - Sexual exploitation of LGBTQ+ youth is vastly under-researched, underreported, and overlooked.
 - Screening youth for CSEY is uncommon.
- Up to 40% of youth experiencing homelessness are LGBT.
 - 58.7% of LGBT homeless youth are at risk of CSEY compared to the 33.4% of straight homeless youth.
- Daily impacts of social inequalities are exacerbated by homelessness, which can then increase the risk of CSE.

Scenario

Let's dissect this challenge as a group

A 17 year old girl who is living in a shelter with her mom and brother finds an advertisement online for a modeling gig. After the first photo shoot, the photographer says she knows how the girl can make more money. She agrees to pose for explicit photos, and then is pressured into explicit videos, which soon leads to having sex with men for money. After several "sessions" she is able to afford a motel for her family. She has no idea that she is being exploited.

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Barriers for Youth Exiting Homelessness

Barriers While Exiting Homelessness

The path to stability is not linear

- Legal barrier- accessing ID documents
- Challenges exiting "the life"
- Lack of wraparound services
 - Ex: Case management, crisis care and outreach, survivor services
- Lack of extended care services
 - Ex: Supportive housing, mental health care, legal aid
- Limited access to health care
- Finding supportive workplaces
- Finding healthy support systems or safe spaces



Solutions and Best Practices For Providers

Partner With Youth

Youth engagement = higher self-efficacy & positive self-esteem

- Partnering with young people is vital when addressing services that impact their lives directly.
- Prioritize shared decision-making.
 - Incorporate honest and open discussions.
 - Provide updates on youth and young adults' input.
 - Help them understand the decisions on the table through training and guidance.
- Build trust through interpersonal relationships.





Practice What You Preach

Create a system of inclusivity

- Create intake processes and assessments that are inclusive of LGBTQIA+ and other marginalized identities.
- Provide youth with up-to-date information on resources and services available in their community.
- **Screen** ALL youth ages 10+ for Commercial Sexual Exploitation (CSE) using the CSE-IT.
- Regularly **train** frontline staff on working marginalized populations, and youth who have experienced trauma (including CSEY).
- Display visual indicators of inclusivity and safety supports.



Collaborate Across Systems

Strengths-based partnerships

- Develop cross-systems relationships in your community to better identify available resources and provide wraparound care. Promote cross-systems communication and training for provider organizations.
- Know where to find resources for youth who require unique assistance such as survivor services, legal aid, health care, or parenting support.
- Screen new potential resources to ensure the safety and security of youth beforehand.



Impact and Improvement

Using policy to make systems more inclusive

• In 2019, TNOYS successfully got the first line item in the State's budget specific to supporting YYA homelessness

Looking forward, we want to:

- Create housing options without barriers.
 - Ex: mental health, criminal records, ID, voucher acceptance, affordable housing allows records with nonviolent offenses
- Expand funding to support housing services for YYA
