
TNOYS' 40th Annual Conference is scheduled to take place June 13 - 16 in Houston, Texas. A limited virtual day will also be available.

**TNOYS' Youth Engagement Roadmap** 






# Young Adult Leadership Council (YALC)

# Content Warning

## Terms and Definitions

- **LGBTQIA+** | An acronym for Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer or Questioning, Intersex, and Asexual.
- **Sexual Orientation** | An inherent or immutable enduring emotional, romantic, or sexual attraction to other people.
- **Gender Identity** | One's innermost concept of self as male, female, a blend of both, or neither how individuals perceive themselves and what they call themselves.
- **Gender Expression** | External appearance of one's gender identity, usually expressed through behavior, clothing, haircut, or voice, and which may or may not conform to socially defined behaviors and characteristics typically associated with being either masculine or feminine.
- **Survival Sex** | Exchanging sex in order to secure basic needs for youth this could be-Housing, Shelter, Food, Money, Shower, Drugs to cope, etc.
- CSEY | An acronym for Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Youth.



# Risk Factors for Youth Homelessness & CSEY

## Risk Factors for Youth Homelessness

#### How did we get here?

- Economic hardship
- Familial dysfunction
- Abuse or neglect
- Mental health challenges
- Foster care involvement/ aging out of care
- Exiting the juvenile or criminal justice system






## Risk Factors for LGBTQ+ Youth Homelessness

#### A pervasive issue

- Exposure to violence
- Lack of acceptance
  - Family or caregivers
  - Discrimination
  - Employment
- Difficulty accessing services
  - Supportive housing
  - Healthcare

## Risk Factors & Vulnerabilities for CSE

#### Disproportionate impacts

- Family disruptions
- Prior abuse or neglect
- Mental health needs
- Housing instability
- Child welfare involvement

- Juvenile justice involvement
- Gender identity & LGBTQ+
- Race and ethnicity
- Unmet emotional & psychological needs





## Pathways to Commercial Sexual Exploitation

#### A slippery slope

- Some pathways that lead to CSE while experiencing homelessness include:
  - Romeo exploitation (seduction by romantic or sexual partner)
  - Guerilla exploitation (violence, threats, force)
  - Peer-to-peer recruitment
  - Gang-based recruitment
  - Internet enticement (social media, chat rooms)
  - Illicit sexually oriented businesses (SOBs)
  - Survival sex





# Trauma and Adversity

## Adversity and Trauma



Adapted from Ellis, W., Dietz, W. (2017). A new framework for addressing adverse childhood and community exp. The building community resilience (BCR) model. Academic Pediatrics, 17(75), S86-S93.

- Adversity refers to the event(s) themselves.
- Trauma is the overwhelming
   nature of an event or repeated
   events and the accompanying
   harm that it creates for an
   individual.
- Adverse Childhood Experiences (ACEs) are potentially traumatic events that occur in childhood.



## The Effects of Trauma

#### The Five B's of Trauma

- Brain
- Body
- Beliefs
- Biology
- Behavior

Would you rather be alone forever or always have other people around?


Would you rather be constantly tired or constantly hungry?

# Challenges While Experiencing Homelessness

## Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs

Basic needs: physiological & safety needs

- Housing
- Food and water
- Warmth/shade
- Physical safety






## Maslow's Hierarchy of Needs

Psychological & self-fulfillment needs

Sense of community, felt safety

 Supportive & safe access to cost-effective therapy


Self autonomy





## Additional Factors that Create Vulnerabilities

#### **Compounding factors**



- Criminalization of homelessness
  - Ex: Camping bans, survival crimes
- Evictions
- Not enough services to meet demand
- Location of services
  - Lack of transportation
- Limited access to healthcare
  - Ex: Gender care



## Survival Tactics and Behaviors

### Getting by while experiencing homelessness

- Survival Tactics
  - o Survival sex
  - Couch hopping
  - o Avoidance
- Survival Behaviors
  - Self-medicating
  - Self-isolation
  - Running away
  - Closeting one's identity





# Barriers to Exiting Homelessness & CSEY

## Barriers to Exiting Homelessness

#### The path to stability is not linear

- Legal challenges
  - Ex: Access to an ID, name change, eviction, etc.
- Lack of wraparound services
  - Ex: Case management, crisis care and outreach, survivor services
- Lack of extended care services
  - Ex: Supportive housing, therapy, legal aid
- Limited access to health care
- Difficulty establishing adequate employment
- Limited options finding healthy support systems or safe spaces



## Barriers to Exiting "The Life"

#### The path to stability is not linear

- Limited awareness of exploitation
- Inability to get basic needs met elsewhere
  - Ex: Housing, hygiene, food/water, healthcare, emotional needs, etc.
- Trauma bonds
  - Inability to escape exploiter physically or psychologically
- Fear or distrust of other adults or caregivers
- Lack of wraparound and extended care services
  - Ex: Housing, crisis care and outreach, workforce, addiction recovery



# Scenario Activity

## Scenario

#### Let's dissect this challenge as a group

A 16 year old boy is kicked out of his grandmother's house after coming out to her as gay. He finds a couple friends to stay with in between being on the streets, but he is running out of options. He later finds an advertisement online for a modeling gig. After the first photo shoot, the photographer says he knows how the boy can make more money. He agrees to pose for explicit photos, and then is pressured into explicit videos, which soon leads to having sex with other men for money. After several "sessions" he is able to afford a motel room of his own. He has no idea that he is being exploited.



## Scenario Activity

#### 10 minutes

- 1. Clarify the problem Identify the problem(s) that arise in this scenario.
- 2. **Identify options** Brainstorm a number of different options that are available to address the problem at hand.
- 3. **Weigh outcomes** Talk through some of the options presented and possible outcomes of going in those directions. Weigh pros and cons.
- 4. **Do it. Listen. Reassess.** Decide on a direction and talk through implementation as a group. How do we see this playing out? What are some possible future barriers or complications that might arise?
  - a. **During**: What might happen in the moment?
  - b. After: What might happen immediately after the situation?
  - c. Follow-up: What might happen 1-2 weeks later?
  - d. **Before**: How can we prevent this situation from happening again?



# Solutions and Best Practices For Providers

## Partner With Youth

#### Youth engagement = higher self-efficacy & positive self-esteem

- Prioritize shared decision-making.
  - Practice open and honest communication.
  - Allow youth to have a say in their daily lives.
  - Help youth understand what is on the table.
- Provide opportunities for youth leadership and skill-building.
- Uplift youth voices and ensure services are survivor-informed.
- Build trust through interpersonal relationships.





## Practice What You Preach

#### Create a system of inclusivity

- Create intake processes that are inclusive of LGBTQIA+ and other marginalized identities. Display visual indicators of inclusivity and safety.
- **Screen** ALL youth ages 10+ for CSE using the Commercial Sexual Exploitation-Identification Tool (CSE-IT).
- Assess strengths and needs of youth to develop individualized service plans.
- Regularly train frontline staff to best meet the needs of youth with complex trauma histories, such as experiences of marginalization, systems involvement, and CSEY.
- Support youth with long-term service planning.



## Collaborate Across Systems

#### **Strengths-based partnerships**

- Know where to find resources for youth who require services your organization cannot provide.
  - Screen new potential resources to ensure youth's safety and security before they go.
- Develop cross-systems relationships in your community to better identify available resources and provide wraparound care.
- Maintain relationships through shared goals and objectives, formalized partnerships, and regular communications.
