



Negative Consequences of Using VI-SPDAT




Households that didn't exit our system after 1 year






Client Outflow Metrics






Gather essential data to help at both the system and individual client level


Allow both the client and assessor to have input

All Clients: Year look back (July22 - June23)





Total Hat Breakdown: Housing Intervention












Factors causing Homeless Situations



















Planning Ahead

- 2-year retrospective study
- Compare housing matches to HAT info and returns to homelessness
