Lived Experience Committee (LEC) Recruiting



THN, as the lead agency for the TX BoS CoC, is recruiting individuals who have experienced homelessness to serve on a committee. This committee will provide THN staff with valuable input on homeless services within the CoC.

Requirements for participation:

- 1. Has experienced homelessness
- 2. Lives and/or works within the geographic boundaries of the TX BoS CoC

Important Considerations:

The LEC meets monthly by video call, and meetings last about 1.5 hours each. Members who wish to receive compensation for participating in meetings will receive \$40 per meeting.

Medicaid Renewals & Homelessness



After a 3-year pause, Medicaid is back to requiring people to renew their coverage every year. Medicaid provides health care coverage to low-income households. From July 2023 to September 2024, it is estimated that at least 15 million current Medicaid members will lose coverage, including almost 7 million members who may still be eligible. *People experiencing homelessness are more at risk of losing coverage, as Medicaid members receive their renewal packets at their last known mailing address.* Most people experiencing homelessness may not have a mailing address or their mailing address has changed in the past three years. Without an updated mailing address, they may not realize they need to renew - and risk losing access to this critical health care resource.

Homebase is pleased to share that they have created <u>resources</u> - including a <u>toolkit</u>, <u>executive summary</u>, and forthcoming toolkit in Spanish - to help people experiencing homelessness maintain their coverage. The toolkit equips service providers, people experiencing homelessness, Medicaid experts and partners, and communities to keep current Medicaid members covered. The tool provides background on Medicaid and the renewal process, an overview of how the process impacts people experiencing homelessness, tips and steps that homeless service providers can take to help clients maintain coverage, ways to learn more about the policy landscape in a particular state, and guidance for people experiencing homelessness on how to navigate the renewal process.

We encourage you to share this resource widely with relevant partners, including Local Homeless Coalitions, advocates, homeless service providers, health care partners and application assisters, legal aid services, lived experience advisory groups and more.

Zoning Reforms That Improve Access to Housing for All: Evidence and Lessons for Advocates

To address housing shortages and housing affordability crises, state and local governments are increasingly looking to zoning code reform to enable housing types beyond single-family homes to be built in their communities. But how much do these policies alone improve access to housing for all, and what else do policymakers need to consider to create sustained and significant positive change in our housing markets? Join the Urban Institute and guests as we discuss how states and localities have embraced zoning reform, the evidence supporting the effectiveness of upzoning, and other policies that should be paired with zoning reform to achieve racial equity and social mobility through housing. The event will feature a dialogue among researchers, practitioners, policymakers, and advocates about the main barriers to passing and enacting zoning and other types of pro-housing reforms and strategies to overcome them. Our speakers will draw from their expertise and knowledge about places like Oregon; Seattle, Washington; Chicago, Illinois; Austin, Texas; and Charlottesville and Alexandria, Virginia.
